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#### **Introduction & Background**

St. Johns County beaches are home to several species of endangered or threatened wildlife such as sea turtles and the native Anastasia Island Beach Mouse (AIBM).







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#### **Introduction & Background**

Beach Driving and other recreational uses are a tradition on St. johns County Beaches. These uses can potentially impact protected species activities and their fragile habitat.





# **ITP/HCP**

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#### Incidental Take Permit (ITP)

The Endangered Species Act is a law regulated through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, it protects plants and animals that have been listed for protection;

**Take** is defined as harm, harass, kill etc.;

The take of federally listed species of plants or animals is illegal under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) of 1973;

The ITP is an amendment to the ESA authorizing "incidental take" of endangered species related to current law abiding activities;

St. Johns County has a 20 year ITP that contains conditions to minimize impact to beach mice and sea turtles.



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#### Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP)

\*Protects 5 species of sea turtles and the native Anastasia Island Beach Mouse (AIBM);

\* A document required to accompany the ITP application;

Minimizes impact to protected species;

ITP/HCP goal is to sustain the social, recreational, cultural, economic, and environmental values of the beach by allowing continued beach access.

Boundaries:

North/South Boundaries – From the Duval County line south to Flagler County line, excluding Fort Matanzas National Monument

East/West Boundaries – Mean Low Water (MLW) to the Coastal Construction Control Line (CCCL)

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#### **The Night Time Nesting Process**



An adult female will drag herself ashore, crawl up to the dune line...

...dig an egg chamber with her back flippers, deposit nearly 100 soft leathery eggs...

The eggs must incubate in the sand undisturbed, for about 2 months.



...disguise her nest, and return to the sea.





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#### Night Time Sea Turtle Events – Nesting & Hatching

Sea turtles typically nest and hatch in the early morning hours – between 12-4am;

Turtle(s) should be allowed to complete nesting without disturbance.



Should be noted that it these images were taken with permission, and it is illegal to approach



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#### **Daytime Sea Turtle Events - Nesting**

Sea turtles rarely attempt to nest during the day;

- Typically occur from April to October;
- Sea turtle should be allowed to complete nesting with no disturbance;

After gates have opened County staff may halt or redirect beach traffic. **Daytime Nesting St. Augustine Beach**

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## **Daytime Sea Turtle Events - Hatching**

Often occur during cloudy and rainy days;

Typically occur June to October;

Hatchlings are allowed to travel to ocean on their own;

- Gate openings may be delayed;
- After Gates have opened, County staff may halt or redirect beach traffic.

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#### Daytime Sea Turtle Events – Washback Hatchlings

Hatchlings are often "washed-back" in masses of seaweed after large storm events;

Minimize impact by avoiding the "wrack line" or line of seaweed;

Do not attempt to put sea turtle hatchlings back in the ocean, they are exhausted and/or injured and must be collected;

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#### Sea Turtle vs. Land Turtle

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#### Sea Turtles

Have flippers and streamlined shells for swimming, live only in the ocean

#### Land/Aquatic Turtles

Have legs and claws for navigating on land, dome shaped shells to hide from predators, live on land or in lakes in ponds



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Status: Endangered (Federal)

The only mammal native to the coastal dunes of Anastasia Island;

Are light buff-colored with indistinct white markings on nose and face;

Reseed dune system by digging burrows for food storage and nesting;

Rarely encountered during the day.

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# **Sensitive Species**

#### **Migratory Shorebirds**

- Variety of seasonal species utilize local beaches to nest;
- Most nest in small "scrapes" in sand which can be easily disturbed by vehicular/foot traffic;
- Nesting area is cordoned off with signage;
- Protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and/or the Endangered Species Act.





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## **Human Impacts & Sensitive Species**

turtles, nests, and beach mice may be run over by vehicles;

\*<u>Recreational & Commercial Fishing</u>: Driving on the beach to and from fishing destination, fishing debris, improperly discarded line, can all have negative impacts to sea turtles;

\*<u>Recreational Beach Activities</u>: Recreational equipment (tents, volleyball courts), storing

personal property (kayaks, chairs, boats), and special events (July 4th) can damage dune

\*<u>Beach Driving</u>: Adult, hatchling, live stranded, and live "washback" post-hatchling sea

\*<u>Horseback Riding</u>: Horse tracks can cause harm to incubating nest, emerging hatchlings or

vegetation, sea turtle nest, and possibly beach mice burrows;

beach mice.

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#### **Human Impacts & Sensitive Species**

\*<u>Coastal Armoring</u>: Permanent armoring structures diminish quality habitat by crushing nest and burrows, degrading the primary dune system, and/or diminishing food resources for beach mice;

✤<u>Beach Lighting</u>: Beach driving and coastal development both produce light pollution that can negatively affect nesting and hatchling sea turtles causing them to lose their way on the beach;

Pollution: Cigarette butts, balloons, plastic bags, straws, glass, monofilament from fishing activities, and other clear plastics are harmful to sea turtles and beach mice;

\*<u>Derelict Vessels</u>: After storm events, beached large vessels can pose a risk to driving conditions and habitat, please report observations to 904-209-0331, select option #7.











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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Driver Awareness**

Speed limit 10 mph;

Permittee shall yield the right-of-way to pedestrians;

Permittee shall avoid accident or collision with coastal inhabitants (sea turtles, shore birds, beach mice, etc.);

Driving is not allowed within 15 feet of marked sea turtle nests;

Vehicle must be driven SEAWARD upon approaching a marked sea turtle nest;

15 feet seaward from base of dune or line of permanent vegetation - No sitting, standing, storing personal property, driving, parking is allowed.









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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Commercial Fisherman Permit**

Allows vehicular beach access for Commercial Fishermen with valid State Saltwater Products License with RS endorsement;

HCP Training and permit is valid for one year;

Combinations provided monthly, May-October, by phone and should not be shared;

Annual beach pass must be affixed to windshield;

Orange permit hanging from rear-view mirror, and magnetic plaque must be affixed to both passenger and driver side doors when conducting commercial fishing activities;

Magnetic plaque is to be displayed whenever on beach conducting commercial fishing activities.



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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Commercial Fisherman Permit**

Magnetic plaques & Vehicle Hang-tag is to be displayed whenever on beach conducting commercial fishing activities.

# PERMITED COMMERCIAL FISHERMAN

Permits are NON-TRANSFERABLE





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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Driving & Parking**

Commercial Fishing Hours of operation on beaches May 1 – October 31: 5:00AM to 10:00PM;

Obtain monthly combination for Crescent Ramp, Porpoise Point, and Vilano Ramps;

Permittees are prohibited from giving beach access combinations to unauthorized individuals;

Before 8:00 am and after 7:30 pm drive below cone line or most recent high tide line;

During Normal Beach Hours 8am-7:30pm, drive West of the cone line.

#### **Exclusively for Permitted Commercial Fishermen**

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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Tides & Night Time Driving**

Be mindful of the changing tides ;

Turtle Patrol looks for turtle tracks in the sand;

Stay below the most recent high tide, so your vehicle does not traverse turtle tracks;

At night, depending on the moon phase, use running lights or low beam headlights.







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#### Think "Red/ Orange" When Fishing at Night

The colors red & orange in the light spectrum does not disturb turtles;

Use red/orange filter stickers on flashlights or chemlight sticks.









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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Combination Locks**

Combination line is at center row of tumblers;

Turn the tumblers on the lock, do not leave combo in lock, or "dummy lock" the gate;

Do not spray WD-40 into lock part – this ruins the lock;

Upon entering or exiting, close and lock gate behind you (especially important at Vilano Ramp);

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## **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Combination Lockout**

In the event of a named storm (hurricane/tropical depression), nor'easter, or other anticipated storm-surge event the Sheriff will determine if beach access closures are required.

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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### Law Enforcement

Natural Resource Deputies (NRDs) under St. Johns County Sheriff's Department in partnership with Beach Services;

 4 Total Deputies – 2 designated on North Beaches & 2 designated on South Beaches

NRDs are year-round deputies whose priorities involve habitat conservation regulatory compliance;

City of St. Augustine Beach contributes 2 officers solely responsible for enforcement on City beaches during the summer peak season.





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# **Permit Conditions & Compliance**

#### **Other Beach Code Regulations** Fishing:

- Prohibited to fish from the beach and/or surf after having been warned by the Sheriff or County Lifeguard concerning the welfare of other beach patrons;
- Prohibited to fish within 600 feet from shore to intentionally fish for sharks or to fish by those methods commonly known as "chumming" or "blood baiting."

#### Dogs:

- Prohibited to run "off-leash" without owners control;
- Defecation must be removed from beach.
